## NEHRU YUVA KENDRA SANGATHAN AN INTRODUCTION



Youth are a major human resource for development and thus, key agents of social change, economic development and technological innovation. This is a vital vibrant and dynamic human resource having bearing on the future state of not only India, but also the entire world. There is, therefore, a need for youth involvement in a country, in its development programmes, as well as in activities based on the youth's specific needs, desires and aspirations.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) facilitates the mobilization of rural youth, in the age

group of 15 to 35 years, towards this end. The largest grass-root level voluntary organization of its kind in the world, NYKS was established to harness and channelize the power of youth on the principles of volunteerism, self-help and participation.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has 623 district offices to manage youth programmes and activities at district level, 29 zones for monitoring and coordinating the activities at the state level. NYKS also has village based youth clubs affiliated to it.





The principal objective of NYKS is to mobilize, motivate, organize rural youth of the country and enhance their capacities to develop democratic institutional mechanisms in the form of village based Youth Clubs. It is to further develop and empower them to become productive and responsible citizens, assume local leadership to act as active partners in the process of community development and nation building activities with the spirit of equity, secularism and voluntarism.

The purpose behind these clubs at the grass-root level is to form village-level action groups of youth that may come together for their own overall development and work with concern for the poor.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan strength lies in 9710 National Youth Corps volunteers and the vast network of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals at the grass-roots level. Through NYKS, these village-based organizations have become local pressure groups as well as catalytic agents for socio-economic, cultural, political and environmental transformation. Many of these groups have in fact become Functional Action groups with rural sustainability and self-reliance as their hallmark.

When viewed in these terms, the role of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan could be defined as that of not merely an organization, but that of a mass movement.

## Genesis

The Nehru Yuva Kendra were established in 1972 with the objective of providing the non-student rural youth with the opportunity to grow and achieve goals, The organization and mobilization of the youth for developmental work in the villages, with emphasis on Value, Vision and Voluntary action.

The goals of NYKS are:

- To develop the values and skills of rural youth so that they become productive, responsible citizens of modern India.
- To involve them in nation building activities.
- To work toward promoting an environment where all-irrespective of caste, colour, sex



or religion- find equal opportunity to serve the nation.

- To pursue self-sufficiency in resources.
- To utilize the networks of NYKS for the development and promotion of programmes in the priority sector of employment generation, literacy and family welfare.
- To empower women through increased outreach and coverage of education, better health care and diverse income generating activities.

As a leading youth organization, NYKS functions as a non-governmental implementing body for the major quantum of mobilization and



developmental activities in the sphere of non-student rural youth.

## FROM AN ORGANISATION TO A MASS MOVEMENT

### Scope and Structure

Considering that almost three-fourths of the Indian population is rural, the development of the nation as a whole depends on their progress and development. The needs of the rural people, especially the youth, vary radically from their urban counterparts. It is in this context that the NYKS was formed to harness the power and empower the rural youth towards self-development and service to the society.

The youth as a group come forward to combat various local problems which ultimately should lead to rural sustainability, self-reliance and consequently, national development.

### Reaching Out to the Youth

NYKS promotes leadership, character development, community service, self-reliance,



secularism, democracy and patriotism as the essential features for national development. The organization conducts various programmes aimed at mobilizing the youth in this direction, thus building a sense of national identity and integration, based on eschewing fear and violence.



### Infrastructure at the District level

For the implementation of different programmes and activities, NYKS has a trained cadre of District Youth Coordinators, National Youth Corps (NYC) Volunteers, Youth Leaders and Social Workers throughout the country. These Youth Groups come forward to tackle various local problems, which ultimately affect national development. Rural sustainability and self-reliance have become the hallmark of every active Youth Club/Mahila Mandal and they aspire to become Functional Action Groups.

### Responsiveness to the Needs of the target group

In order to fulfill the needs, desires and aspirations of non-student rural youth (target group), various programmes and activities have been organized through a trained cadre of Youth Coordinators, NYKS, Youth Leaders and Social Workers throughout the country. Moreover, different developmental agencies and department at various levels are also involved so that the benefit of various development schemes and programmes reach the needy and deprived sections of the society.

### The Structure

The NYKS has a four-tier structure. At the helm of NYKS is a Board of Governors. The Union Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports is the ex-officio Chairperson of the Board of Governors. Director General is the executive head and is responsible





for managing day-to-day affairs and activities of the Sangathan. There are 29 state level Offices headed by Zonal Directors, who is responsible for ensuring that the policies and programmes of the Sangathan are properly implemented in the field, heads each Zone.

A Youth Coordinator heads each District level office called Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK). His role is to spearhead the Youth movement in the field. He is assisted by the Accounts Clerk-cum-Typist, a group D and 8-10 National Youth Corp Volunteers, who are deployed for a period of one to two years as per the scheme of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. The district level office with their NYCs is the most important tier of the structure where ideas are transformed into reality.

Under the Chairmanship of the District Magistrate/Collector, every district of the State has a District Advisory Committee on the Youth Programme (DACYP). The DACYP guides, supports and monitors the activities of the NYKs. It deliberates on the Annual Action Plan guidelines and approves it. The DACPY further monitoring the activities and provide necessary support to the NYK in fulfilling the laid targets. The constitution of DACYP confirms the representation of major institutions and department involved in district development so as to facilitate functional linkages and harnessing resources for effective implementation of programmes.

## Core Strength of NYKS

The core strength of NYKS is a net work of 2.81 Lakh village level Youth Clubs across India with an enrolment of about 8 million rural youth volunteers. It has become one of the largest Youth organizations in the world. These Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals are engaged in the areas like education, training, awareness generation, leadership and personality development for addressing social issues, community development and social welfare activities.

The Government of India through its rural youth based flagship organization the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan achieve the set objectives through Core Programmes which are uniformly distributed amongst the district kendras in the country; implement Schemes of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports; undertake Special Programmes and Projects in coordination and support of other development Agencies, Ministries and Departments of Centre and State Governments and UNO meant for youth development and empowerment.

A paradigm shift in the utilization of the vast network of NYKS and its field units has commenced. One such role which NYKS has recently taken as a major initiative has been synergy and convergence of efforts with the Government of India as well as State Governments. Youth Clubs and NYC volunteers now provide ample opportunities and a suitable platform for outreaching various programs and schemes of the Government of India and the State Governments.

The youth associated with Nehru Yuva Kendras are not only socially aware, motivated but are also inclined towards social development work through voluntary efforts. For all these years, NYKS activities remained focused both on economic and non-economic development and welfare activities including poverty alleviation programmes with active involvement of Youth Clubs, Mahila Mandals and village communities. However, a lot more remains to be done.



## Objective of NYKS Programmes and Activities

The goal of the Programmes and activities being undertaken by NYKS during 2015-16 is Development and Empowerment of Rural Youth. The objective is to mobilize, motivate and organize rural youth of the country; enhance their capacities to develop democratic institutional mechanisms in the form of village based Youth Clubs with due representation of all sections of society and enable target audience to live a meaningful, productive and healthy life.

Another objective of the programmes and activities is to facilitate youth assuming local leadership to act as active partners in the process of community development and Nation building activities with the spirit of equity, secularism and voluntarism; behave as responsible citizens and contribute towards the processes of peace building and Nation building activities and addressing their needs, issues and vulnerabilities as well as structural and underlying factors.

### Focus and Areas being addressed

NYKS during the financial year 2015-16 has been focussing on its 09 Core Programmes at District, State and National Level with emphasis on mobilising the resources to provide more programmes and activities for the benefit of rural young people and village communities in general. Core Programmes aimed at strengthening the Youth Club network and capacity building of Youth Club Members. These Programmes are common to all district NYKs.

NYKS also undertook coordination activities thereby contributed towards poverty alleviation, employment generation, self employment, SHG formation, civic education, social issues, environment awareness including plantation, Swachh Bharat Mission - hygiene, sanitation and

cleanliness drives and campaigns; health awareness including HIV/AIDS, drug abuse and alcoholism prevention education, blood donation, yoga, voluntarism and disaster mitigation as well as democratic leadership among youth.

### Strategies adopted for achieving the objectives

- About 9710 NYC volunteer were deployed by NYKs across the country. Out of which about 1000 were computer literate so as to facilitate district NYKs in promoting e-governance and updating Youth Clubs profiles.
- The services of the deployed NYC volunteer force were optimally utilized. For this purpose, they were trained on the line with the expectations of the current NYKS Annual Action Plan, NPYAD Scheme of MoYAS, and Coordination Activities in identified focused areas as mentioned above.
- Depending upon the number of blocks and villages in a district, NY volunteer were deployed on cluster of villages having Youth Clubs for implementation of NYKS Core Programmes, NPYAD Scheme and targeted Coordination Activities and follow up activities in their respective allocated areas.
- The youth who were covered under NYK Core Programmes were motivated and supported to organize similar awareness and education programmes in their respective villages. For this purpose, they were facilitated by designated NY volunteers and resource persons on the identified issues in which they have undergone exposure under NYKS Core Programmes.
- In order to quantify the outcome, each NYC Volunteer was assigned targets.



## Coordination, Convergence and Synergy

In order to provide more programs for the furtherance of the objectives of NYKS and in achieving the set goal; emphasis was given on coordination and establishing linkages with other development Departments, Agencies, NGOs at district, state, national and international levels. The initiatives in this direction are as follows:

- To ensure proper programme planning, coordination, implementation, transparency and monitoring for effective functioning of district NYKs with expected outcomes, meetings of District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP) under the Chairperson ship of Deputy Commissioner / Collector of respective districts were organized district NYKs.
- Similarly, meetings of State Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (SACYP) headed by Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs and Sports of a State and Heads of development agencies and other non-official members were organized at by respective Zonal Directors.
- District and Zonal NYKS have been asked to establish effective Convergence/Synergy in different programmes, functioning and other operational areas with NSS and NCC. In this regard, Action Plan highlighting extent of convergence/synergy between NYKS & NSS as well as NCC Youth/ Volunteers/ Cadets respectively in each others' programmes has been developed.
- Linkages between developmental Ministries, Departments, and Agencies were established for sanction of projects for the development and empowerment of youth, in the identified focus areas and local needs.

## Participation of Public Representatives

There was overwhelming response and participation of Public Representatives viz. Hon'ble Ministers, MPs, MLAs, MLCs as well as Heads of Development Departments and Agencies in NYKS programmes and activities at different levels across India.

## Achievements of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS)

NYKS during the financial year 2015-16 focused on its 09 Core Programmes. These Programmes aimed at strengthening the Youth Club network and capacity building of Youth Club Members. These Programmes are common to all district NYKs. Besides, NYKS also implemented the schemes of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports as well as coordinated at District, State and National Level to mobilize additional resources so as to provide more programmes and activities for the benefit of rural young people and village communities, in general.

## CORE PROGRAMMES



### DETAILS OF CORE PROGRAMMES CONDUCTED BY NYKS

#### a) Core Programmes

A summary of Core Programmes along with significant achievements follow:

#### 1. Youth Club Development Programme

The programme is aimed at strengthening the existing network of Youth Clubs with representation from all sections of society, publicize the Schemes of Central Government viz. Pradhan Mantri Jan-Dhan Yojna, Swachh Bharat Mission and Construction of Toilets under Nirmal Bharat Abhiyan. The programme was implemented in campaign mode rather than a

routine exercise. During the campaign, youth were made aware and mobilized about these schemes through a network of village based Youth Clubs. They were also motivated to popularize and adapt these schemes and motivate others to get the benefit out of these schemes. Team members met and interacted with youth leaders, Gram Panchayat Pradhans & Members and other opinion leaders in the villages. They also disseminated information about NYK and its Annual Action Plan 2015-16, verified current status of Youth Clubs and updated their Youth Club's Profile, Membership details in the prescribed format. Concerned District NYKS uploaded the Youth Club Profile online which is displayed on NYKS Website.





For organization of each of Youth Club Development Programmes, Rs. 15,000/- were earmarked. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

## 2. Training on Youth Leadership and Community Development

The programme is aimed at developing leadership qualities, personality development and enhancing skills for taking up community development initiatives among the youth through 3 days training programmes so that they can act as agents of social change and dissemination of information among masses in general and youths



in particular about various schemes & programmes of Govt. and other Development Departments, Agencies for youth development. For organization of each of Training on Youth Leadership and Community Development Programmes, Rs. 27,500/- were earmarked. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

## 3. Theme Based Awareness and Education Programme

Aimed at creating awareness among youth about Skill Development Training leading to employment generation, self employment, SHG formation, link opportunities with emphasis on local district /village based opportunities to



check migration; Civic Education, Social Issues, Environment, Swachh Bharat Mission - Hygiene, Sanitation and Cleanliness Drive Campaigns; Health awareness including HIV/AIDS, Drug Abuse and Alcoholism prevention education, Voluntarism and Disaster Mitigation as well as Democratic Leadership among youth and other issues of social concern. For organization of each of Theme Based Awareness and Education Programmes, Rs. 8,000/- were earmarked. Duration of each programme was of one day.

#### 4. Promotion of Sports

##### i) Sports Material to Youth Clubs

The programme is aimed at development of sports culture among the rural youth. Assistance is provided to the Youth Clubs for purchase of basic sports materials for sports activities to be undertaken on a regular basis. For providing sports kits to Youth Clubs, a budgetary provision of Rs. 2,000/- was made for promotion of sports and games in the villages. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

##### ii) Inter Youth Club Sports Meet at Cluster & District Level

The programme is aimed at popularizing and encouraging rural sports and games among Youth Clubs established by NYKS. Another objective of the programme was to make sports activities as a natural process and way of life in rural India and also to provide opportunities to youth to exhibit their



talent. Sports events were selected by District NYKS as per sports infrastructure and play fields available in a particular block. Rs. 15,000/- and Rs. 25,000/- were provided for organizing each cluster and district level Inter Youth Club Sports Meets, respectively. Duration of each Meet was of two days or as per the need of the events. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

#### 5. Skill Up-gradation Training Programmes (SUTP) for Young Women & Men

The programme was implemented in all 623 Districts. The endeavor is to enhance their





employability by running a variety of employable skill based training courses with the support of Trainers, reputed/recognized Skill Development Agencies. For organization of each of Skill Upgradation Training Programme, a budgetary provision of Rs. 19,000/- for 4 months and Rs. 9,800/- for 2 months per course was made. ## 6. Promotion of Folk, Art and Culture

The programme is aimed to facilitate rural youth understand and appreciate their folk, art and cultural aspects as well as provide them opportunity

These Programmes were organized with special reference to folk songs, folk dances, folklores etc. For organization of each of Promotion of Folk, Art and Cultural Programmes, a budgetary support of Rs. 20,000/- per district was made. The programme is mainly focused on generation of awareness about critical issues of

For this purpose, each of the 623 district NYKs were provided a budgetary support of Rs. 70,000/- for observance of minimum 24 days of National & International importance. ## 8. District Youth Convention and Yuva Kriti

The programme is were undertaken annually by all District NYKs to provide opportunity and platform to Rural Youth Leaders to display products and express





themselves, share experiences and suggest best practice programmes for youth empowerment. This programme sensitizes Youth Clubs Leaders on various issues of their interest such as Role of Youth Clubs in nation building, generation of awareness about issues relating to available opportunities for their employment and how to take benefit of the various schemes/ programmes of different ministries, Agencies, departments, etc. For organization of District Youth Convention and Yuva Kriti, budgetary support of Rs. 30,000/- per district was made. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

### 9. Awards to Outstanding Youth Clubs

The programme is aimed to recognize the voluntary services rendered and encourage Youth Clubs to undertake community development &



welfare activities. Youth Clubs which have been recognized as catalysts of social change and these Clubs can play a vital role in activities such as skill training, creation of durable community assets in villages, national integration, sports, culture, health and family welfare, environment enrichment, self-employment, women empowerment, eradication of social evils, community development, etc. Awards were conferred at the District level, the winners



were awarded a sum of Rs.25,000/- and at the State level the award was of Rs.1,00,000/- and at the National level, three awards of Rs.5,00,000/,- Rs.3,00,000/- and Rs.2,00,000/-. The Youth Clubs utilize the award money in community development projects/ programmes. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

### 10. Meetings of District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP)

This activity by itself is not a youth programme but is one of the most imperative for the field functionaries to ensure proper programme planning, coordination, implementation, transparency and monitoring for effective functioning of district NYKs with expected outcomes. It also aimed at minimizing the missing link between the District Administration if any and NYK for undertaking coordination programmes and mobilization of resources for youth development and empowerment. In order to render more services to the youth, NYK at district level develops linkages with the district administration, district authority, eminent social workers and youth leaders, for guidance and facilitation.



The District Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (DACYP) is formed in each district by the



NYK to achieve the desired synergy and coordination of the kind mentioned above. It is mandatory to hold DACYP meetings twice in a year (2nd & 4th quarter) for which the initiative is taken by its member secretary, i.e. District Youth Coordinator of NYK. District Collector/ District Magistrate Chairs the meeting and other development officers in the district attend meeting by the order of the Chairperson.

Similarly, a State Advisory Committee on Youth Programmes (SACYP) has been constituted in each State. SACYP is Chaired by Hon'ble Youth Minister of the State and it meets twice in a year. Rs. 2,000/- @ Rs. 1,000/- and Rs. 3,000/- @Rs.1,500/- were given to each of 623 district NYKs and 29 Zonal Offices, respectively for arranging minimum meetings. The amount was utilized for tea and other organizational expenses including, file folder, writing pad, pen, reference material, photographs, etc.

## STATE/ZONAL LEVEL PROGRAMMES



### 1. Planning, Review and follow up Meeting

The objective for organizing Planning, Review and follow up Meeting was to Review the progress of ongoing programmes & activities of NYKs and monitor the progress with constructive interventions by involving consensus on all relevant issues, to plan innovative projects & programmes for youth development and empowerment. It was also to suggest measures for strengthening the existing networks of Youth Clubs and to share information about the ongoing schemes and programmes of the Government (both State as well as Central Govt.) for youth development and expedite coordination.

Under this programme, contingency plan and strategy for implementation in case of need was prepared and executed. Yearlong activities to be

carried out by Youth Clubs were chalked out and prioritization of activities was done.

Zonal Directors convened a minimum of 04 meetings as per the need and requirement. The duration of each of the meeting was one day. All Dy. Directors and District Youth Coordinators working in the zone were invited for the meetings. Rs. 200/- per meeting and per Deputy Director & District Youth Coordinator of the Zone were given to Zonal Offices.

### c) Swachh Bharat Mission

On the call of Hon'ble Prime Minister of India and to realize Gandhiji's dream of a Clean India by the 150th Birth Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi in 2019, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has undertaken Swachh Bharat Mission through 623 District NYKs, 29 Zonal offices with involvement of 12000 NYC Volunteers and village based Youth Clubs. The Mission was focused on participation of all sections of society to bring about mass awareness and a lasting behavioral change to achieve this goal.

In this context, NYKS launched the Mission on 25th September, 2014, the Birth Anniversary of Pt. Deendayal Upadhyaya Ji which was followed

by field level activities with participation of NYKs Youth Clubs, NYC volunteers and village communities. During the launching function, Hon'ble Ministers, MPs, MLAs, bureaucrats, eminent persons from all sections of the society were involved. Toilets and garbage places were cleaned in office complexes of 623 Districts and 29 Zonal offices of NYKS. Global Hand Washing Day on 15th October and the World Toilet Day on 19th November were observed to spread the message of cleanliness.

The members of Youth Clubs were motivated to undertake Special Cleanliness Drive in their respective areas. Cleaning Drive includes, eradication of weeds, collection of polythene bags

and plastic material for disposal, maintenance of public property (anganwadi centres, PHCs, etc.), sheds on road sides and bus stand, cleanliness of street and common places, maintenance and repair of cremation grounds, maintenance of play grounds, schools and community toilets, digging, maintenance, disinfection, de-silting and repair of ponds, wells, natural drinking water resources, small irrigation channels, water tanks, water harvesting, etc. These activities were organized with great zeal and gaiety.

The issues of Cleanliness and Sanitation Education were made integral part of NYKS Programmes and Workshops and Training Programmes for Youth Club Leaders/Members, NYC Volunteers and NYKS field officials were organized on "Swachh Bharat". Members of NYKS Youth Clubs and NYC Volunteers motivated villagers for construction of sanitary latrines. As a result, 9,238 latrines were constructed.

## d) National Young Leaders Programme (NYLP)

A new Central Sector Scheme, named National Young Leaders Programme (NYLP) for development of leadership skills among the youth has been introduced by Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India during 2014-15. The National Young Leaders Programme is having the following components:

1. Neighborhood Youth Parliament (NYP)
2. Youth for Development Programme (YFDP)
3. National Young Leaders Awards (NYLA)
4. National Youth Advisory Council (NYAC) and
5. National Youth Development Fund (NYDF).

The objective of the NYLP Scheme is to create an institutional platform right up to the village level, where the youth can articulate their views on various issues and draw the attention of the local administration to such issues/ concerns affecting their lives.

During the year 2014-15, only Neighborhood Youth Parliament at Block level and Youth for Development Programme (IEC: Publicity and Media activities) were carried out by 623 district Nehru Yuva Kendras with the active participation of NYC Volunteers and NYKs Youth Clubs. A brief on NYLP programmes undertaken during 2015-16 follows:

### 1. Neighbourhood Youth Parliament

The platform of Youth Clubs is being developed further in the shape of vibrant 'neighborhood youth parliament'. The purpose is to educate the members of Youth Clubs about contemporary socio-economic development issues confronting local communities in general and the youth in particular and to involve them in debate/ discussions on such issues.

During these programmes, eminent Speakers delivered talk on contemporary issues like: Good Governance, Youth Participation in Govt. Schemes, Prime Minister Jan Dhan Yojna, Swachh Bharat Mission, Construction of Toilets, etc.

Youth Leaders from different clubs were motivated that after return to their respective areas, arrange similar discussion/debate involving their club members. These Programmes were broadly structured on the pattern of 'Block Youth Parliament'. Village level Government functionaries as well as Gram Panchayat Pradhan/ members, Agnawadi workers, Aasha Workers, etc. were invited to such Programmes. Village level Neighborhood Youth Parliament has been a follow-up action of block level Neighborhood Youth Parliament.

After each Programme, the recommendations were drawn up and the same were submitted to concerned Government functionaries as well as the Gram Panchayat for their consideration. In each programme, 80 youths of that particular Block participated in Block level Neighborhood Youth Parliament. Achievements under this Programme are as follows:

In addition, 11,078 Village-level Programmes were organised, involving 4.36 lakh youth.

### 2. Youth for Development Programme (YFDP)

The programme aimed at involving youth in Sharamdaan (voluntary labour) on a large scale all over the country. This is to develop the personality and leadership quality of the youth and promote the spirit of dignity of labour. Voluntary labour is useful for the local area or community. The youth were motivated to undertake cleanliness activity under Swachh Bharat Mission. Youth of the country has been appealed to spare at least 100 hours per year (2 hrs. in a week) for Swachh Bharat Mission activities. In order to reward outstanding work done under the programme, awards have been given to 1972 Youth Clubs.

A massive IEC: Publicity and Media Campaign was carried out in 197 District NYKs.



## CELEBRATION OF DAYS OF NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL IMPORTANCE



### 1. International Youth Day (12th August, 2015)

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan celebrated International Youth Day on 12th August, 2015 by organizing various programmes at Viswa Yuvak Kendra, New Delhi. The theme of International Youth Day was "Youth Civic Engagement" as declared by the United Nations.

International Youth Day was observed on 12 August 2015, to bring youth issues to the attention of the international community and celebrating the potential of youth as partners in today's global society.

While speaking on the occasion, Major General Dilawar Singh, Director General, NYKS said that today is an opportune moment to acknowledge the enormous potential youth possess and their invaluable contribution towards making a better

world to live in. Throughout the world, there is a greater realization and increased premium on youth power now, more than ever before in human history. He further said that making young generation socially aware and community sensitive is a daunting task which requires Youth Empowerment issues to be taken care of more systematically and seriously. India is taking-up the issue of Youth Empowerment through three pronged approach namely Skill Acquisition for economic opportunities. Life Skill Education to know the daily life nuances and respond in a mature manner and awareness on Social and Community life so as to be able to learn and ensure youth civic engagement in a more predictable pattern.

40 Youths from South Korea and Sri Lanka as part of their international youth exchange programme participated in the event. Apart from them, 25 international students from the University



of Delhi representing about 12 countries and 90 youth club members of NYKS, also participated in the celebration. Besides, 20 media representatives and 20 other officials making a total strength to 200 made it to the event.

During the programme, the participants, both Indian and International students showed keen interest in job employment opportunities and raised their queries to Ms. Silky Raheja from NSDC who talked on "Skilling India" initiative of the Government.

Thematic discussions and information campaigns was taken place to understand the needs of young people, to implement policies to help them overcome the challenges they face, and to encourage young people into the decision-making process.

## 2. Sadbhavana Diwas observed (20th August, 2015)

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan observed the birth anniversary of late Rajiv Gandhi as Sadbhavana Diwas. The theme of Sadbhavana was to promote national integration and communal harmony among people of all religions, languages and regions. Goodwill towards everyone and eschewing violence are the motto of the Sadbhavana Diwas. Exhibition on Life & Works of Rajiv Gandhi, Sadbhavana Rallies, lecturers by eminent personalities, cultural programmes etc. were organized to mark the birth day of Indias' Late Prime Minister Shri Rajiv Gandhi.

## 3. Celebration of Hindi Fortnight

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has observed Hindi Fortnight from 14th to 28th September, 2015 with zeal and gaiety. During this period, several competitions including Essay Writing, Slogan Writing, Sulekh, Noting & Drafting, Cultural Programmes, Seminars & Workshops, etc. were organized at various levels. The fortnight was observed by 623 district NYKs by involving village based youth clubs.

## 4. Observance of Birthday of Pt. Deendayal Upadhyaya



Birth anniversary of Pt. Deendayal Upadhyaya on 25th September, 2015 was observed with great zeal and gaiety by district Nehru Yuva Kendras in the country.

An intensive cleanliness & hygiene campaign was launched by all district Nehru Yuva Kendras by involving NYC volunteers, affiliated Youth Clubs and other key stake holders in the districts.

## 5. Celebration of Gandhi Jayanti (2nd of October 2015)

Commemoration of the Gandhi Jayanti on 2nd of October 2015, was organized by the Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals affiliated with District Nehru Yuva Kendras. The Programme was conducted with an objective to spread the message of





goodwill, better understanding and feelings of brotherhood, social and national integration among the people, especially among the youth.

Thousands of youth from Youth Clubs/ Mahila Mandals, a symbol of peace and social integration took part in various functions organized at different levels. The programmes started with the Sarva Dharm Prathana offered by young singers. "Vaishnav jan to tene kahiye jo peer parai jane re", Gandhiji's favourite songs and bhajanas were sung.

As a part of the programme, activities such as Prabhat Pheri, Sarv Dharm Prathna, Photo Exhibition of life & works of Gandhi, Awareness Campaigns, Wall Writing, Cleanliness Drive, Work Camp (Community Development Programme), etc were organized.

## 6. Vigilance Awareness Week - 2015 (26th to 31st October, 2015)

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan observed the Vigilance Awareness Week from 26th to 31st October, 2015, which commenced with a pledge taking ceremony. The theme of observing Vigilance Awareness Week was "Preventive Vigilance as a tool of Good Governance."

In the district Kendras of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan, the pledge taking ceremony was held. Banner on Vigilance Awareness Week was exhibited. The activities like essay, slogan writing, etc. on anti-corruption topics amongst the employees of NYK, NYCs were organized. Discussions were also held through Youth



Clubs/ Mahila Mandals in the districts. Lectures on the topics viz. Youth against corruption, transparency in NYKS/ Government programmes, 'Right to Information', Provision of value based services to the society/ public, and other relevant topics were also organized.

## 7. Observance of Birth Anniversary of Late Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel as 'Rashtriya Ekta Diwas' (National Unity Day) on 31st October, 2015

Rashtriya Ekta Diwas was jointly organized today by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan, NSS and SAI in a befitting manner at SAI playground, Guwahati. On this occasion, 5 kms Run for Unity programme was organized in the morning at 7.00 a.m. A total of 1200 participants including citizens of Guwahati participated. The run was jointly flagged off by Hon'ble MP Shri Ramen Deka of Mangaldoi and Smt. Taifunnesa, eminent sports person of Assam.



On this occasion, a convention was also organized in the SAI play ground at Guwahati which was inaugurated by Shri Sarbananda Sonowal, Hon'ble Minister of State (I/C), Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India. Hon'ble MP of Darjeeling Shri S S Ahluwalia, Hon'ble MP of Mongoldoi Shri Ramen Deka and Shri Dilip Saikia, Vice Chairman, NYKS graced the occasion. More than 2,000 youth took part in the convention.

The programme was started with paying tribute to Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. Hon'ble Minister



urged the youth to devote themselves in nation building so that India can become greatest country in the world.

Similarly, the Zonal and District Nehru Yuva Kendra offices organized programmes in their respective offices and administered pledge for National Unity Day to all employees and NYC volunteers.

Pledge taking ceremony was also taken place at National Hqr. of NYKS under the chairmanship of Major General Dilawar Singh, Director General.

Members of Youth Clubs also organized programmes in their villages with the support of local community.

### 8. Celebration of NYKS Foundation Day & Nehru Jayanti (14th November, 2015)

Birth anniversary of Shri Jawaharlal Nehru was observed by District Nehru Yuva Kendras on 14th November, 2015 with the active involvement of National Youth Corps (NYC) volunteers. On this occasion, various types of programmes which promote sadbhawana, peace, solidarity, national integration were organized. Rich tributes were given to Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru.

Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals were motivated to organize programmes and activities throughout the year in their respective villages by mobilizing local resources. As a result of motivation,



a number of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals organized activities viz. seminars for discussing the philosophy & teachings of Pt. Nehru, Exhibition on Life and works of Pt. Nehru, sadbhawana rallies, pad yatras, administration of sadbhawana pledge, community singing, cultural programmes, Sharamdaan Shivirs (work camps), Cleanliness Drive, sports & games, legal awareness camps, medical camps, etc. in their respective villages on voluntary basis.

### 9. Observance of Quami Ekta Diwas (19th November, 2015)

19th November was observed as Quami Ekata Diwas on 19th November, 2015 and the celebration was continued upto 25th November,



2015. The day was observed by District NYKs with great zeal and gaiety involving NYC volunteers and village based Youth Clubs.

On this occasion, cultural programmes, sharamdaan shivirs (work camps), cleanliness drive, sports competitions, seminars, lectures by eminent personalities on "Role of Youth in promoting Quami Ekta", etc were organized. The youths were administered Communal Harmony Pledge.

### 10. National Constitution Day celebrations continue (26th November, 2015)

First Constitution Day on 26th November, 2015 was observed by district NYKs and Zonal Offices in a befitting manner. NYC Volunteers in



position visited at least one village and briefed youth about the history and process adopted in the formation of Constitution of India as well as the key role played by Dr. B. R. Ambedkar.

The Preamble to the Constitution was read aloud followed by placing the framed copy of the Preamble in their offices.

Many Youth Clubs also organized programmes such as Youth Rally, Essay & Slogan writing competitions, lectures by subject experts, etc. in their villages. They delivered speeches on the basic philosophy and fundamental values on which the Constitution was framed.

Major General Dilwar Singh, Director General, NYKS apprised the officials about the Constitution and its importance. He said that the constitution of India was framed to provide smooth functioning of the nation. It is a document which every citizen holds in high esteem and respect. Celebrating this day is an opportunity to inculcate the values incorporated in it among NYKS functionaries.

He further said that each Hindustani is an ambassador of hope, secularism and democracy. It is very important that the young minds are trained to be the torch bearers for the same. Rights are followed by Duties and our NYKS functionaries should understand and practice the same.



## 11. World AIDS Day observed (1st December, 2015)

World AIDS Day, observed on 1st December every year, is dedicated to raising awareness of the AIDS pandemic caused by the spread of HIV infection.

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan observed a World AIDS Day on 1st December, 2015 through village based Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals. Essay, Seminars and Rallies etc. were organized for creating awareness on HIV/AIDS and check its spread. Moreover, the lectures and group discussions were also held on different aspects of HIV/AIDS and importance of voluntary blood donation.



## 12. Observance of International Day of Persons with Disabilities (Accessible India Campaign- Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan) - 3rd December, 2015

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has observed International Day of Disabled Persons on 3rd December, 2015 across the country through its village based network of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals. The day was observed as "Accessible India Campaign (Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan)" for creating universal accessibility in built environment, transport system and ICT eco -system.

The principal objective of this day celebration was to improve the understanding of the people towards the people with disability issues as well as



get together to support them to improve their self esteem, well being and rights in the society. It also called for to involve all the persons with disabilities in the society in every field of life such as the political, economic, social and cultural.

As a part of observance of the day, awareness generation activities such as motivational lectures, discussions for building enabling environment by youth, speech, honouring of disabled persons, dissemination of the schemes of the Government for the welfare of disabled persons, etc. were organized with the active participation of members of NYKs Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals, organizations of persons with disability.

In addition to the above, peoples were sensitized about various problems faced with disabled persons with reference to accessibility in public places like creating ramps in schools, colleges , hospitals, gram panchyat offices and other post of public places. For this purpose, Shake Holders and

Service Providers were involved during the awareness generation campaign.

### 13. International Women's Day (IWD)

District Nehru Yuva Kendras observed International Women's Day (IWD) on 8th March, 2016. Different type of programmes and activities including cultural programmes, lectures by eminent personalities, etc. were organized to mark the achievements of women in various fields.

The eminent speakers on the occasion were invited and they dwelled largely on the issues of Health & Education, Land and Property Rights, Crimes against Women, Sexual Harassment - Eve teasing, Dowry, Child Marriage, Female Infanticide and sex selective abortion, Domestic violence, Trafficking, etc. They spoke at large the role of social activists/ reformers and had attempted on their life a several time.

Large number of members of youth clubs took part during the women's day celebrations.





## SPECIAL ACTIVITIES



1. Celebration of International Day of Yoga on 21st June 2015 at State, District, Block and Village Levels across India and participation in National Capital Celebrations at Rajpath, New Delhi

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan observed International Day of Yoga on 21st June, 2015 at State, District, Block and Village Levels across India and participated in National Capital Celebrations at Rajpath, New Delhi in a befitting manner. For this purpose, two Video Conferences with 29 States Zonal Directors and Deputy Directors were conducted by the DG, NYKS and Secretary, Youth Affairs. Hon'ble Minister of State (i/c) Youth Affairs and Sports visited Assam, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh to review preparations. DG NYKS also visited and reviewed the progress and preparations at Guwahati, Patna, Kolkatta, Delhi and Lucknow.

The services of NGOs and their experts, identified by M/o AYUSH and other organizations were utilized. The Booklet (both Hindi and English) and DVD provided by M/o AYUSH were circulated to all NYKS Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals and placed on NYKS website: [www.nyks.org](http://www.nyks.org), for necessary guidance. NSS and SAI were coordinated for joint mobilization of volunteers and infrastructure support.

The activities organized at various levels were widely covered by print and electronic media. Action photographs were placed on Face book of DG, NYKS website and URL of Ministry of AYUSH.

### ➤ State Level Functions

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) organized State level events on the International Day



of Yoga on 21st June 2015 at four State Capitals i.e. Lucknow, Guwahati and Kolkata besides large functions at Zonal/State, District, Block and Village Levels across the entire nation. In Mega programs 31,770 trained youth demonstrated Yoga as per Common Yoga Protocol.

During the program at three State Capitals eminent 24 Yoga Gurus were honored. On this occasion, Youth Conventions were also organized during which lectures by Experts on six different subjects of Yoga were delivered. Hon'ble Governors, Central Ministers and other dignitaries attended these programmes.

### ➤ National Capital at Rajpath New Delhi

1000 Youth trained in Common Yoga Protocol drawn from NYKS affiliated Youth Clubs participated in three enclosures. Besides, 9 Foreign Nationals from seven countries which were mobilized by NYKS, also participated in the celebrations.

### District Level Functions and Exhibitions

Trainings on Common Yoga Protocol and preparatory activities were organized in 623 District NYKs for successful organization of mass Yoga practice and demonstration as per Common Yoga Protocol. District NYKs organized mass Yoga Demonstration as per Common Yoga Protocol. Besides this, Exhibition on Yoga & Handicraft, Youth Convention, Lectures by Experts on different subjects of Yoga were arranged in which 3,72,667 members of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals took part. In Mizoram, Nagaland, Meghalaya including Tripura and Assam, International Day of Yoga was observed jointly with the Assam Rifles.

During District Youth Conventions, subjects experts delivered lectures on the topics like: what schemes and programmes of New Government have reached to the youth and whether they are useful / beneficial to them, Youths personal physical and sports development, Yoga- Indian Culture and

Heritage (Yoga not only develop a person's body but also the mind as well as it is key for coordination and Yoga and its importance and usefulness in treatment of ailments), Skill development - Opinion of youth that which skill is important and which type of skill training they wish to undertake and other issues of youths' concern.

Hon'ble MPs, MLAs, Public Representatives, DM/DCs and other Dignitaries attended the activities.

### ➤ Village Level Functions

Nearly one Lakh NYKs Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals carried out Mass Yoga Demonstration, Honouring of Yoga Experts, talk by subject experts on Yoga and other activities in their villages by mobilizing local resources. During the Yoga Day Celebration, Gram Panchayat Pradhans, officials of Development Departments, NGOs, Social organizations and local citizens attended the activities.

### ➤ Block Neighbourhood Youth Parliament - 10th to 19th June, 2015

For motivating NYKs Youth Clubs, District Nehru Yuva Kendras organized 4,183 Block level Neighbourhood Youth Parliaments for which @ Rs. 12,000/- were provided. 3,33,174 Presidents/ Secretaries of 85,106 Youth Clubs participated in the programmes. One hour session was devoted on Yoga and Training. During these programmes, lecturers on benefits of Yoga, Demonstration of Yoga Practices as per Common Yoga Protocol, Documentary (DVD) show on Yoga followed by discussion were conducted.

Trained members of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals participating in the Parliaments were motivated to organize Yoga Camps/ Demonstrations in their villages by mobilizing local resources and Yoga experts.

The purpose for organization of Neighbourhood Youth Parliament is to educate the



members of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals about contemporary socio-economic development issues confronting local communities in general and the youth in particular and to involve them in debate/discussions on such issues.

During these programmes, eminent Speakers delivered talk on contemporary issues like: Good Governance, Youth Participation in Govt Schemes including Prime Minister Jan Dhan Yojna, Swach Bharat Mission, Construction of Toilets, etc.

Youth Leaders from different clubs were motivated that after return to their respective areas, they will arrange similar discussion/ debate involving their club members. These Programmes were broadly structured on the pattern of 'Block Youth Parliament'.

After each Programme, the recommendations were drawn up and the same were submitted to concerned Government functionaries as well as the Gram Panchayat for their consideration.

## 2. Commemorative Events organized by NYKS in 128 Districts of India as a part of 125th Birth Anniversary of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar

### Genesis

The genesis of the program lies with the Hon'ble Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi Ji greeting the people of India on the historic occasion of 1st Constitution Day (26 November 2015) and said may this day inspire you to know more about our Constitution as well as remembering the stellar contribution of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar.

In order to celebrate the 125th birth anniversary of Dr. B R Ambedkar with a nationwide programme beginning April 14, an executive committee was set up by Hon'ble Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Home Minister, Shri Rajnath Singh.

### Objective

- ❖ To disseminate knowledge about life and works of Bharat Ratna Dr B R Ambedkar among the target group.
- ❖ To give them exposure and orientation to understand essential oneness of all religions, cultures, traditions and above all unity in diversity of Indian life.
- ❖ To sensitize them to fight against social evils prevailing in the society especially caste restrictions.
- ❖ Build an enabling environment at various levels for establishing ownership & partnership in the process of organization of various types of Programmes and Activities by involving local community to commemorate 125th Birth Anniversary of Dr B R Ambedkar.
- ❖ To make the people aware of the threat posed by communal and disruptive forces and make them mentally and morally prepared to safeguard the common heritage and secular fiber of the country.

### Coverage and Activities

- a) Activities such as Sports Tournaments, Youth Convention, Photo Exhibition on Life and Works of Dr. Ambedkar, Run for National Unity were organized in 128 districts across India with participation of youth from all cross sections of society. The programmes were organized during 2015-16 and on 14th April, 2016 (125th Birth anniversary of Dr. B.R.Ambedkar).
- b) The venues of the programs were preferable the site identified with Dr. B.R. Ambedkar. Programs started with offering floral tributes on the Portrait of Dr. Ambedkar Sahib.
- c) To high light the programmes and activities and their venues, banners, placards with slogans



and posters on the subject were displayed by the concerned district NYKs.

- d) During the conduct of programmes and activities, prominent personalities and officers were invited, who gave talk on life and works of Dr. Ambedkar as well as highlighted and explained the key points to be learnt and motivated the audiences to come forward to further disseminate the knowledge in their respective villages.
- e) Eminent Speakers also delivered talk on contemporary issues like: Good Governance, Youth Participation in Govt. Flagship Schemes including Prime Minister Jan Dhan Yojna, Atal Pension Yojna, Pardhan Mantri Bima Suraksha Yojna, Pardhan Mantri Jeewan Jayoti Bima Yojna, Swachh Bharat Mission, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Inderdhanush, Skill Development, Water Conservation, participation in Saansad Adarsh Gram Yojana and other Flagship Schemes for the benefit of youth and masses.
- f) It was followed by on an average of 4.5 kms Run for National Unity which traversed through the main lanes and bazaars of district Headquarters. During the Yatra a large number of banners, placards and posters on life and works of Dr. Ambedkar were carried by Youth Leaders and Volunteers and they chanted Patriotic Slogans and Songs, which created an environment of brotherhood and nationalism.
- g) Run for National Unity Programme was culminated at a pre-decided venue - preferably the site identified with Dr. B.R. Ambedkar. Here, following theme based activities were conducted, which created awareness and motivated youth and others who attended the program.
  - Talk on Life and works of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar
  - Talk on recent initiatives of Government of India
  - Cultural programme, One Act Play on the theme of contribution of Ambedkar Sahib
  - Film on Life and works of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar
  - Felicitation - who worked for down trodden persons of the society
  - Sah Bhoj (Community Meal)
- h) On an average 5 to 6 activities were organized at each of the venues which were attended by 1,14,773 female and male youth who directly received and disseminated the messages of the program through a variety of activities. For more details may please see Annexure - 14 & 15.
  - i) During the function, the leaflets and other printed materials were distributed amongst the dignitaries and youth leaders.
  - j) For visibility of the programmes & activities, Backdrops and Banners were displayed on the venue of the programme. On the Banners, the Logo and photos of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar were also displayed.
  - k) The celebrations were widely covered by both print and electronic media.

### Dignitaries and Resource Persons attended Programs

- 95 dignitaries such as - 02 Hon'ble Governors, 07 Hon'ble Union Ministers, 12 Hon'ble Member Parliament, 14 Hon'ble Ministers of State Governments, 36 MLAs/MLCs, 08 Mayors and other local Public Representatives and officers of District Administration graced the events.
- Padma Shree & Padma Bushan Sania Mirza, the Youth Icon motivated the youth at Coimbatore to keep them physically fit, mentally alert and play a leading role in Nation Building activities.



The dignitaries and resource persons presented their thoughts on life and works of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, inspiration one can draw from him and motivated them to further disseminate the gained knowledge among their peers.

### 3. Youth Conclaves

Youth Conclaves were organized in Guwahati, Nagaon, Lakhimpur, Dibrugarh and Silchar of Assam between 21st to 29th January, 2016. In each of the 05 conclaves, more than 3000 youth from adjoining districts took part. Four Conclaves (Silchar, Nagaon, Dibrugarh and North Lakhimpur) were inaugurated by Shri Sarbananda Sonowal, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge), Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India.

Ms. Nirmala Sitharaman, Hon'ble Minister of State for Commerce and Industry, Finance, Corporate Affairs and inaugurated the conclave organized at Kamrup on 29th January, 2016. Shri Rajan Gahain and Shri Rameshwar Teli, local Members of Parliament graced the Conclaves.

Shri C.S. Parela, Shri V.D. Sharma and Shri Dilip Saikia, all the 03 Vice Chairpersons and Shri Dinesh Pratap Singh and Ms. Rani Nighot Dwivedi, BOG Members of NYKS were also present on the occasions.

In addition to the above, at each of the 05 locations, prominent district personalities, scholars, academicians, researchers, social activists, and officers interacted with audiences.

The platform was used for disseminating information and orientation on programmes of NYKS, schemes MoYA&S as well as National Flagship Schemes of Central Government. Strategies were evolved for effective partnership of youth in

development process for nation building. The issues of social and national importance which needs to be taken up with the spirit of volunteerism and addressed in a time bound manner were highlighted and discussed at length.

The objective of the programme was to provide opportunity and platform to youth to express themselves, share experiences and suggest best practiced programmes for youth empowerment and their partnership in development of nation, to sensitize and motivate youth to fight against various social evils prevailing in the society and assume leadership in addressing them. Another objective of the conclaves was to prepare the youth to disseminate the acquired knowledge among people in general and youths in particular and build an enabling environment and disseminate information on the National Flagship Programs of the Government and the sources from where the youth can avail benefit and facilitate their promotion among other groups of beneficiaries

For success of the programme, Developmental Departments, Agencies, NGOs, Resource Persons and others who can contribute towards the objectives of the programme were involved.

The Conclaves were started with singing of National Song - the song Vande Mataram. Community songs promoting unity and brotherhood, respect to all religions, and mutual understanding were also recited.

The subject experts delivered lectures on the topics such as Good Governance and Civic Responsibilities, Prime Minister Jan Dhan Yojna, Atal Pension Yojna, Pradhan Mantri Bima Suraksha Yojna, Pradhan Mantri Jeewan Jyoti Bima Yojna, Swachh Bharat Mission, Nirmal Bharat Abhiyan - Construction of Toilets, Digital India, Make in India, Skill India, Beti Bachao - Beti Padhao Abhiyan, Saansad Adarsh Gram Yojana, Yoga for Harmony



and Peace and other Flagship Schemes for the benefit of youth and masses.

During the function, the leaflets and other printed materials were distributed amongst the dignitaries and youth leaders. The National Youth Corps Volunteers and youth leaders were motivated to share the same with NYKs affiliated Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals in each of the targeted districts. The programmes were widely covered by Electronic & Print Media.

#### 4. Raksha Bandhan - Suraksha Bandhan

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan has started Raksha Bandhan - Suraksha Bandhan Campaign on 29th August, 2015 through its Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals. This campaign basically promotes the existing insurance schemes which were started by Hon'ble Prime Minister such as Sukanya Samridhi Yojana, Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana (PMSBY), Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana (PMJJBY), Atal Pension Yojana and Pradhan Mantri Jan-Dhan Yojana. All these schemes are

aimed at Suraksha. Under this campaign, the Youth Clubs have taken up insurance activity by mobilizing the youth for their sisters in related insurance schemes. This sort of insurance will ensure financial security for the girls and women in the society.

Major General Dilawar Singh, Director General, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan launched the campaign from village Yamuna Khadar (Delhi). While speaking on this occasion, he said that the PMSBY and PMJJBY schemes are very useful because, apart from being financial securities for underprivileged, they also act as collateral in case the subscriber wants to take a loan from the bank. These schemes have an add-on benefit of easy recovery by the financial institutions in case of the death of the subscriber. The Suraksha Bandhan initiative will try to encompass more people under these schemes.

He appealed all the NYKS functionaries to carry out the Campaign in a Mission Mode rather than a routine exercise. Major General Dilawar Singh paid premium of Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana policies for 60 women from his own pocket.

In the changing national environment, the youth is passionate to do something for their Motherland. The Declamation Contests were organised at Block level, District level, State level and finally

at National Level. Wide publicity & media coverage was ensured for successful organization of the contests. People from all walks of life witnessed and encouraged the contests at each level.

The Declamation Contest was organised throughout India

- In 3377 Blocks with participation of 24198 participants,
- In 453 districts with participation of 5609 contestants,
- In 30 States with participation of 420 contestants and
- At National Level on 20th - 21st January, 2016 with participation of 27 contestants



who were the 1st Prize winners of State/Zone level Contests.

The National level Declamation Contest on Patriotism and Nation Building on the occasion of Republic Day Celebration, 2016 was organised by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan under the guidance of Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports and Ministry of Defence, Govt. of India at Stein Auditorium, India Habitat Centre, Lodhi Road, New Delhi on 20th - 21st January, 2016.

Shri Prakash Javadekar, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge), Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Govt. of India while inaugurating the National level Declamation Contest stressed the need of effective communication for Nation Development. At National level the contestant gave their best in the 10 minutes presentation before the august gathering and was appreciated by all present. Shri Rajeev Gupta, Secretary, Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Govt. of India presided over the inaugural function.

## Report on 8th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme 2015-16



The Tribal Youth Exchange Programme is organised every year in collaboration with and funding from the Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India. In this Programme, selected tribal youth from districts affected by Left-wing extremist in the States of Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand and Odisha are taken to other parts of the country.

The programme aims to sensitize them to rich cultural heritage of the Country and to enable them to appreciate the concept of unity in diversity, to expose them to development activities and technological/ industrial advancement in other parts of the country, to enable them to develop emotional linkage with the people in other parts of the country and to develop their personality by enhancing their

understanding of the core life skills, identifying their skill development needs and providing them necessary career counseling.

The 8th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme 2015-16 was organized at 10 venues covering 1990 tribal youth and 202 Escorts from 24 LWE affected districts of the States of Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand and Odisha. ## Rashtriya Punarjagan Yatra Programme



The yearlong Punarjagan Programmen and Yatra which was started from 2nd Oct, 2014 on the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, from four corner tips of the country viz. Leh (J&K), Kanyakumari (Tamil Nadu), Roing (Arunachal Pradesh) and Okha (Gujarat) culminated on 25th Sept15 at Deen Dayal Upadhyay Dham Nagla Chandrabhan Mathura marking the birth centenary of Pandit Deen Dayal Uadhyay, the proponent of Integral humanism.

The aim of the Yatra was to rekindle positivity, passion and leadership amongst the youth in India and at the same time give them an opportunity to engage in Nation Building activities, especially for social and financial inclusion on one

hand and enhancement of civic standards through life skills on the other.

The Punarjagan Yatra traversed through 10000 villages of 100 Districts of 20 States of the country. The programme focused on awareness on flagship programmes of Government, viz. Swachh Bharat Mission, Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana, Shramdaan, Construction of Toilets, Beti Bachao Beti Padoo Abhiyan, Skill Development, Promotion of Volunteer ship spirit and eradication of social evils etc. through Village level Rath Yatra Campaign, Nukkad Natak, Rally, Plantation, Cultural programme, Blood Donation Camps, Neighbourhood Youth Parliament and District Level Youth Conventions. A total of 59,282 village level activities were organized.

## National Programme for Youth and Adolescent Development (NPYAD) Scheme 2015-16



Under the NPYAD scheme of Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports there are following components:

1. Youth Leadership and Personality Development Programme (Promotion of Youth Activities and training),
2. Adventure Camps (Promotion of Adventure),
3. Life Skill Training for Adolescents (Empowerment of Adolescents),
4. National Integration Camps (Promotion of National Integration).

All these four components are being implemented by NYKS with the support of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports and the concerned State Governments are extending their

valuable support through its District Administration.

### 1. Youth Leadership and Personality Development Programme (Promotion of Youth Activities and training)

#### Aims and Objectives:

- To train the youth leaders and to equip them with necessary qualities to assume responsibility for the village and the youth club, and to act as catalytic agents for socio-economic and political-cultural development of the villages.
- To create awareness on social, economic, cultural and political aspects of the rural



communities and equipping the youth with necessary qualities of leadership.

During the period of 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016, NYKS organized 21 Youth Leadership and Personality Development Programmes of 30 days each with 630 participants.

The Highlights of Youth Leadership and Personality Development Programmes

**The Youth Leadership and Personality Development Programmes focused on:**

- Development of Leadership Qualities among rural youth.
- Inculcation of Life Skill Education and core life skills.
- Awareness and capacity building of youth on Agro based and other Vocational skills.
- Self development and Personality Management.
- Entrepreneurship Development and tips on how to begin.
- Career Counselling and Career assessment.
- Stress Management Techniques.
- Team Management and Negotiation Skills.

**2. National Integration Camps (Promotion of National Integration)**

The objectives of the NIC are to bring youth from different parts of the country on common platform; give them opportunity to understand cultural heritage of the country; enable them to recognize threads of unity in diversity which bind every Indian together. Efforts are made to instill and develop in youth the feeling of Patriotism, brotherhood and fraternity.

The set objectives are met through a host of activities viz. cultural programmes, work camps, visit to historical places, family placements, all religions discourses and interactions with messages of



communal harmony, oneness and brotherhood. Besides these, key issues such as Youth Concern, Democracy, Environment protection, Human rights, Constitutional rights and duties, and Development have been identified for presentation, discussion and sharing during each of the NICs and are integrated into their activities.

During the period 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016, 30 National Integration camps were organized across the country with total participation of 6040 youth.

**The Highlights of National Integration Camp**

**The National Integration Camps focused on:**

- Understanding India, Silent features of Indian Freedom Movement, Historical prospective and the contemporary challenges.
- Understanding Indian Democracy, Silent features of constitution of India and the duties and responsibilities of citizen.
- Costume parade (Cultural Rally/Padyatra) programme.
- Disseminating the message of Sadbhavana, Peace, Development and Solidarity among the masses and for displaying the cultural variety, uniqueness and integrity of the country.
- Emphasis was given to inform the participants about National Integration, Communal



Harmony, Indian Constitutions, Democracy, Rights and duties of Citizens, Freedom Struggle, Personality Development, Health Awareness Programme, Disaster preparedness & Management, Environment & Climate Change, Global warming, Language learning, Know India & Knit India etc.

- Field visits to Historical important places.

### 3. Adventure Camps (Promotion of Adventure)

#### The objectives:

- Encouraging spirit of adventure and risk taking amongst youth.
- Build capacity of Youth to tackle situation during national calamities & other emergency.
- Inculcating spirit of nature appreciation with emphasis on ecology and conservation of natural resources.

Activities are being conducted in the areas of Ground/ Rock, Water, Air such as Trekking on well established Tracks, Rock Climbing, Repelling, Safaris, artificial rock /wall climbing, White Water Rafting, Kayaking & Canoeing, long Swimming, Water sports and Para Sailing, Pare Gliding, Hang Gliding, Hot Air Ballooning etc

During the period 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016, 142 Adventure Camps were organised with total participation of 3461 youth.

### 4. Life Skills Training for Adolescents (Empowerment of Adolescents)

#### The objectives:

- To develop among adolescents the behaviour which will empower them to make healthy choices
- To strengthen their Life Skills to cope up with the risky situations they encounter in their lives.
- To enhance knowledge to protect them from HIV and to manage adolescent reproductive sexual health issues and concerns
- To mobilise their collective potential to solve their issues

During the period 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016, 162 programme were organised with total participation of 6877 adolescents.

## NATIONAL YOUTH CORPS



The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has introduced scheme called National Youth Corps during 2010-11, after modifying the earlier schemes of NSVs (1977-78) and RSY (2005).

### Objectives of NYC scheme are ...

- To setup a group of disciplined and dedicated youth who have the inclination and spirit to engage in the task of nation building.
- To facilitate the realization of inclusive growth (both social and economic)
- To act as points for dissemination of information, basic knowledge in the community
- To act as group modulators and peer group educators
- To act as role models for the younger cohort especially towards enhancement of public ethics, probity and dignity of labour.

As per the provision of the scheme, a total of 12,000 volunteers in 623 districts are being

deployed every year. There is a selection committee under Chairpersonship of DM/DC of the district for selecting volunteers. Volunteers in the age group of 18-25 years are being deployed for maximum period of 2 years duration only. Each volunteer is being paid Rs. 2,500/- as monthly honorarium. During the year 2015-16, a total of 9710 volunteers were deployed across the country.

#### Notes on Accounts and significant accounting policies

**1) Basis of preparation of Financial Statements:** The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The Sangathan adopts accrual system of accounting unless otherwise stated.

**2) Fixed Assets and Depreciation :**

- a) The assets created out of Grants are expensed from General Funds and are transferred to the capital funds.
- b) The Assets purchased after the formation of the Sangathan are stated on historical cost basis. These have been revalued in previous years and consequently depreciated / adjusted and transferred to the Capital Fund.

The depreciation charged on Straight Line Method (SLM) as follows:

- c) The Assets pertaining to the period prior to formation of Sangathan were revalued at notional amount of Rs. 1. Similarly Assets received through donations were valued at notional amount of Rs. 1 except the value of land received from the local agencies.
- d) The Sangathan is wholly aided by Government of India under budgetary support. A capital fund equivalent to cost of fixed assets has been created.
- e) All the wasting assets have been accounted for into the books and depreciation on SLM is being charged. Expenditure on the construction of NYK buildings has been capitalized and added to the value of the assets under construction/ constructed. Donated land to district level NYKs has been shown at its historical cost.

**3) Recognition of Income / Expenditure**

- a) Grant in Aid –The grant in aid received from Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India and from other agencies for the year considered on accrual basis.

Grants received under NYKS scheme have been considered as income and taken in Income and Expenditure account.

Grants received for the special / sponsored programs have been considered as ' Earmarked funds' and taken in special fund account. The unspent funds at the yearend have been reported under liability side of the Balance Sheet.



- b) Interest accrued on FDRs has been recognised on Accrual basis.
  - c) Interest on Saving Fund account, affiliation fee, sale of youth manuals have been accounted for on cash basis.
  - d) Interest earned on funds of major special / sponsored programmes namely Adolescent UNFPA, SGSY, Foreign Contribution, CULTEX, KRYCEP, UNDP-TAHA, NIC, NSV scheme, RSY/NRC and NYC have been credited to respective programmes.
  - e) Employee's benefits like Leave Encashment and Bonus are accounted on provisional basis.
  - f) The Expenses incurred by the HO and Zonal Offices have been compiled at Head quarter level on the basis of the information and explanation provided by PAOs through their Financial Statements for the corresponding period. At PAO, expenses have been booked on the basis of UCs received from Kendras.
- 4) **Provisions for Expenses:** During the year provisions of Rs. 0.90 crore for Accumulated Leave Encashment and 7.80 crore for Salary for March 2016 and Bonus for 2015-16 to be paid in 2016-17 has been made.
  - 5) **Balances in Fund Accounts:** There is balance of Rs 12.85 crore in Superannuation Fund, Rs 17.49 crore in GPF and Rs 10.09 crore in pension fund. The General Provident Fund, Superannuation fund and Pension Fund are shown under current liabilities pending approval of the Ministry on formation of Trust.
  - 6) **Actuarial valuation of retirement dues:** Actuarial valuation for retirement dues as at 31.03.2016 has not been done. However, liability of Rs 69.91 crore for Gratuity, Rs 52.87 crore for leave encashment and Rs 539.14 crore for Pension of all employees under CCS (Pension) Rules 1972 as on 31.03.2015 was valued by actuary. Approval from the Administrative Ministry to show this liability in annual accounts statement is awaited. Funds have also been demanded from the Ministry to meet out these liabilities.
  - 7) **Loans and Advances:** Loans and Advances includes (a) Rs. 15.24 crore lying unspent with the field offices and Rs 1.58 crore advances with Kendras for district level generated fund. Since these figures are under reconciliation, it may include expenditure already incurred but not accounted for.
  - 8) **Adjustment of advances & prior period expenditure:** Adjustment against outstanding advances of Rs 5.33 crore pertaining to PAO Bangalore, Lucknow, Bhubaneswar and HQ has resulted in occurrence of "Prior Period Expenditure" under establishment expenditure, core programmes, special and Sponsored programmes have been made.
  - 9) Balances outstanding with Agencies, Suppliers, Zones, Kendras and employees are subject to confirmation.
  - 10) Previous year figures have been regrouped where ever considered necessary. Figures in financial statements have been rounded off to the nearest rupees.
  - 11) There were 2 outstanding paras of Internal Audit Wing, Ministry of Human Resource Development and 18 of DGA(CE) for which replies have been submitted to the auditors.



## Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan for the year ended 31 March 2016

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan(NYKS), as at 31 March 2016, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20 (1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2015-16. NYKS had country-wide network of 623 District level Nehru Yuva Kendras, out of which, comments of 12 Kendras and 2 PAOs are included in this report. These financial statements are the responsibility of the NYKS's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

1. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observation on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
2. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by the management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
3. Based on our audit, we report that:
  - i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit, except mentioned in comment nos. A.1.1.1 (b), A.1.1.2, A.2.2.1, D.1.2, D.2 and D.7 of the Audit Report.
  - ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure/Receipts & Payments Accounts dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the Uniform format of accounts approved by the Ministry of Finance.
  - iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by NYKS, in so far as it appears from our examination of such books except for the audit comments mentioned at A.1.1.1 to A.1.1.3 and A.2.2.1 to A.2.2.5, D.1.3, D.9 and D.1.3, D.9 and para 2(v) & 2 (vi) of Annexure to Audit Report.
  - iv. We further report that:
    - A. **Balance sheet**
    - A.1 **Liabilities:**
    - A.1.1 **Earmarked Fund (Schedule-2, 3 and 4)**



**A.1.1.1 (a)** In Schedule-3: Earmarked Funds (Special Programs MYAS) and Schedule-4: Earmarked Funds (Sponsored Programs) forming part of Balance Sheet as at 31.3.2016, there were negative opening and closing balances under the programmes as detailed in **Annexure-A**. The aggregated value of negative balances worked out to ₹ 228.29 Lakh under 19 programmes of NYKS.

The details are indicative of the facts that NYKS had incurred excess expenditure over the grants received and the amounts are receivable. However, the same were not shown as receivable but shown as negative figures under liability, which needs to be corrected.

**A.1.1.1 (b)** Closing balances of Earmarked Funds (Special Programme) and Earmarked Funds (Sponsored Programme) shown under Schedule-3 and Schedule-4 respectively could not be verified, as the basic records in support of closing balances were not shown to audit.

**A.1.1.2** There was expenditure incurred/ transferred/ refunded under the programmes which were showing negative opening balances and received no grant for additional expenditure during the year resulting in increase of negative balances. The aggregated value of these negative balances worked out to ₹ 455.11 Lakh under 13 programmes of NYKS. The details are given in **Annexure-B**. Reasons for the same were not shown to audit.

**A.1.1.3** There was expenditure incurred/ transferred in several cases (shown in **Annexure-C**) in excess of funds available/grant received resulting in negative closing balance. The aggregated value of these negative balances worked out to ₹ 168.87 Lakh under 5 programmes.

Necessary adjustments/reconciliation in respect of negative balances should be made in accounts.

**In the light of above comments, it is not possible to form an opinion on the correctness of the figures shown as negative balances in the annual accounts. These discrepancies were also reported in the previous report but no remedial action was taken by NYKS.**

**A.1.1.4** The programmes mentioned in **Annexure-D** had positive opening balances but no interest income was depicted in the schedules against the programme. Non-depiction of interest income towards these programmes had resulted into understatement of liability by the amount of interest earned on the opening balances of these programmes and overstatement of interest income of NYKS for the year 2015-16. The monetary impact of these 28 programmes works out to ₹ 29.65 crore.

**A.1.1.5** As per the Income & Expenditure account, the excess of income over expenditure was to be transferred to the 'Corpus/capital fund'. However, the excess of income over expenditure was transferred to the 'Earmarked Fund-MYAS (Sch. 2)'. This is not in consonance with the Uniform format of accounts and thus, the entire balance of ₹ 46.89 crore is incorrectly shown under 'Earmarked Fund'. This has resulted in overstatement of Earmarked Fund and understatement of Capital Fund by the like amount.

## **A.2 Assets:**

### **A.2.1 Fixed Assets**

**A.2.1.1** The Schedule of fixed assets was not in accordance with the format prescribed under the Common format of Accounts as it does not exhibit the Block wise representation of the assets, i.e.



Gross block, depreciation and Net block and position at the end of the last year, etc. This was pointed out in previous year report, however, no action has been taken by the NYKS.

**A.2.1.2** Kendras and Zonal offices did not prepare balance sheet at the end of each financial year, hence the authenticity of the value of assets and depreciation thereon in annual accounts prepared by PAOs was not verifiable in audit. Further, physical verification of fixed assets for the year 2015-16 was not carried out by District Youth Coordinators.

**A.2.2 Current assets Loan and Advances - (Schedule-7)**

**A.2.2.1** Loans, Advances and Other Assets of NYKS showed a negative balance of ₹ 26,75,971 under head Long Term Advances (Computer/Vehicle/Scooter) and negative balance of ₹ 4,24,151 under head Scooter advance. The reasons for these negative advances were not appraised to audit.

**A.2.2.2** Under head ‘Advances - With Kendras pending utilisation certificates’ negative balance of advances were shown by PAO Bhubaneswar (₹ 1,37,00,758.95) and PAO, Guwahati (₹ 1,48,462.85). Similarly, negative amount of (₹ 19,17,940.00) by PAO, Guwahati under head ‘Advances with kendra for district level generated fund’ was clubbed with outstanding advances of other PAOs. The negative balances under advances need to be reconciled.

**A.2.2.3** (a) Under head Others deposits Negative figure of Rs. (1,00,106.00)/- shown under PAO Guwahati was clubbed with deposits of Bangalore and NYKS Headquarters as detailed below:

The negative balances need to be reconciled.

(b) Besides, ₹ 10,00,000/- were shown as deposits in NYKS headquarters accounts were actually investment in shares of National Yuva Co-operative society Ltd. (NYCS Ltd.) and should have been classified under Long Term investments of NYKS.

**A.2.2.4** At NYKS Headquarters, audit noted that exactly the same amount of advance appeared in the accounts in several similar heads of accounts during 2014-15 as well as 2015-16.

As funding and expenditure are a continuous process, apparently no effort was made by NYKS to reconcile these advances.



**A.2.2.5** Under the head 'Loan and Advances' (Schedule-7), <sup>1</sup> 15.24 crore were shown as advances with Kendras, pending utilization certificates.

**In view several adverse balances under Advances, Netting of negative figures awaiting reconciliation with outstanding advances as well as depiction of some advances over the years, we are not able to form an opinion on the correctness of the figures shown as 'Advances' under Current Assets.**

**B. Income and Expenditure Account:**

**B.1** Income and Expenditure account of NYKS Headquarters' shows an amount of <sup>1</sup> 1.86 lakh as "Other Receipts" whereas on examining this amount from related vouchers it was found that this amount of <sup>1</sup> 1.86 lakh contains figures of <sup>1</sup> 1.68 lakh – Cheque received towards refund of excess advance released to PAO, Bhubneshwar, <sup>1</sup> 0.16 lakh – DG relief fund received and <sup>1</sup> 0.02 lakh– Miscellaneous deductions such as license fee, furniture recovery, etc. from the employee. This resulted in overstatement of income of NYKS as well as Capital Fund by <sup>1</sup> 1.86 lakh.

**B.2** As per bank statements of Red Ribbon Express (RRE) scheme, an interest of <sup>1</sup> . 256871 was earned on account of RRE but it was depicted under interest on saving Accounts. This resulted in understatement of Earmarked Fund (RRE) and overstatement of interest income of NYKS for the year 2015-16.

**B.3** Opening value of asset – Jeeps was not shown at beginning of Financial Year. However, depreciation was booked by following PAOs on this asset. Negative value of depreciation of PAOs Bangalore, Alipur and Guwahati were netted with actual depreciation shown by PAOs.

Similarly, opening value of asset – Fans was shown as <sup>1</sup> 22,463 at beginning of Financial Year and depreciation was booked by the following PAOs on this asset. Negative value of depreciation of PAO Alipur was netted with actual depreciation shown by other PAOs.

This resulted in understatement of Expenditure (Depreciation) as well as Capital Fund by <sup>1</sup> 3,28,941.

**C. Receipts & Payments account:**

**C.1** There was difference in totalling of accounts for the year ended 31.03.2016 of all PAOs (including NYKS Headquarters) and figures depicted in consolidated accounts of NYKS. Details are given in Annexure-E.

**D. General:**

**D.1** NYKS had a countrywide network of 623 district level Nehru Yuva Kendras each headed by a District Youth Coordinator (DYC). The audit comments relating to 12 Kendras of NYKS are given below:



**D.1.1** Internal audit was pending in NYK, Vidhyadhar Nagar (Jaipur), Zonal Director, NYKS (Chandigarh), Ludhiana (Punjab) and Bundi (Rajasthan).

**D.1.2** Approved accounts for the year 2015-16 were not made available to audit by District Youth Cordinator, NYK, Dhamtari (Chandigarh).

**D.1.3** Cash Book/advance registers/contingency bill register were not properly maintained in Ongole (Andhra Pradesh), Kunjupura Road (Karnal), Jalandhar (Punjab) and Ranagat, Andaman units of NYKS.

**D.1.4** Physical verification of stores was not conducted in Jalandhar (Punjab), Ludhiana (Punjab) and Chandigarh units of NYKS.

**D.1.5** Excess expenditure of <sup>1</sup> 1.75 lakh and <sup>1</sup> 0.26 lakh was incurred on various schemes of Vidhyadhar Nagar (Jaipur) unit of NYKS and excess expenditure of <sup>1</sup> 0.19 lakh was incurred under the non-plan budget of NYKS Chandigarh.

**D.1.6** Non reconciliation of deposits in Jalandhar (Punjab), Ludhiana (Punjab) and non-reconciliation of bank statement in Chandigarh units of NYKS.

**D.1.7** Utilization certificates were pending in Vidhyadhar Nagar (Jaipur) and Bundi (Rajasthan) units of NYKS.

**D.1.8** Non cancellation of expired cheque of <sup>1</sup> 5.93 lakh was pending in Jalandhar (Punjab).

**D.1.9** Examination of Bank Reconciliation Statement of PAO, Bangalore revealed that several payment instruments/cheques which were long expired were not taken back into accounts and continued as balances pending settlement.

**D.2.** Bank Reconciliation Statement of PAO Bangalore revealed that unutilised funds at the end of financial year were realised after long delays (5 to 35 day delay) despite using Core Banking facility for this surrender. Documents in support of timely initiating fund transfer process were not provided to audit.

**D.3** Income and Expenditure account of NYKS revealed that total of Expenditure (previous year ending 31-03-2015) do not tally with total of schedule 13 (Establishment Expenses), Schedule 14 (Other Administration Charges) and Schedule 15(Programme Expenditure) in accounts of 2015-16 as per details given below:

**D.4** Investment of Pension fund was not made as per the pattern of investment prescribed by Ministry of Finance. All the investment amounting to ₹ 14.87 crore (100%) was made under fixed deposits with nationalized banks. This was pointed out in the previous audit report; however no action was taken by NYKS.

**D.5** NYKS did not make the provisions for retirement benefits. The provision based on actuarial basis needs to be made for retirement benefits as required by uniform format of accounts and AS-15 of ICAI.

**D.6** An amount of ₹ 45,30,496 was depicted as closing balance of the RRE scheme in the annual accounts, whereas, the balance as per passbook/bank statement of the account was ₹ 65,97,523. On pointing out, department could not reconcile the difference. Besides, it came to notice that NYKS maintained two similar accounts in Schedule-4 for RRE. These are RRE (balance ₹ 45,30,496) and RRE balance of BS (balance ₹ 53,28,285). NYKS could not provide details of RRE balance of BS to audit.

**D.7** Liability on account of Gratuity (₹ 69.91 crore) and Leave Encashment (₹ 52.87 crore) has been shown in the Notes to Accounts pertaining to actuarial valuation of retirement dues. The same amounts were depicted in annual accounts for the year ending 31.03.2015. The terminal benefits payments actually made during the period 2015-16 have not been factored in while working out the liability towards Gratuity and Leave Encashment in the annual accounts for the year 2015-16.

**D.8** During examination of schedules related to Income and Expenditure accounts of NYKS Headquarters' it came to notice that no income of interest earned on long term advances-House Building Advance was shown whereas House Building Advance was shown outstanding in following PAOs:

Negative figure of ₹ 2,37,970/- shown under head House Building Advance in PAO Bangalore was also netted to work out Total House Building Advance of NYKS. Negative figure needs to be reconciled.

**E. Grants-in-aid:**

NYKS receives grant from the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports for general purpose and special programmes. It also receives grants from other ministries/ departments/ agencies for sponsored programmes. The position of Grants in aid received and utilized by NYKS during the year 2015-16 is given below:

- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report **did not give a true and fair view** in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India;
- In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan as at 31 March 2016; and
  - In so far as it relates to Income and Expenditure Account of **surplus** for year ended on that date.

## Annexure

### 1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System:

The Internal audit by the Internal Audit Wing, Ministry of Human Resource Development was conducted up to 2012-13 and 2 paras were outstanding as of August 2017.

### 2. Adequacy of Internal Control System:

The internal control system of NYKS was found deficient due to the following discrepancies:

- (i) NYKS mentioned that charter of accounts as required in Tally Software is being adhered to by all the PAOs and Branches of NYKS, it came to notice that PAOs operated account heads as per their understanding of transactions. This required regular regrouping of accounts during process of consolidation. Schedule 17 (Cost of Assets) showed several similar heads viz. 'Equipment Sports' & 'Sports Equipment', 'Fixtures and Fittings' & 'Other fittings', 'Other office equipment' & 'Office equipment'. During discussion with NYKS authorities, it came to light that block wise working of depreciation could not be done properly and issues relating to booking of asset in one head and adjustments of depreciation in another head (leading to negative figures of depreciation) exist due to this reason.
- (ii) Budgeting for regular programmes was done at NYKS without calling for estimated expenditure from Kendras. Number of programmes was decided on the basis of criteria fixed by NYKS without taking the input from the Kendras/field offices or assessing the need of conducting the programmes in the districts. As the number of programmes was not based on need assessment and was decided without taking inputs from field units i.e. implementing units, the budgeting on the regular programmes was not realistic.
- (iii) The accounts of NYKS show continuous availability of unadjusted surplus funds under the head Earmarked Fund (Sch. 2) lying with PAOs. Examination of these funds from previous years' accounts show lack of effort on part of NYKS for utilizing/adjusting the same. This has led to accumulation of funds and surplus funds of <sup>1</sup> 46.15 crore remained blocked up to 31.3.2016. (The amount was <sup>1</sup> 46.73 at the end of 31.3.2015).
- (iv) Release of funds to NYKS and its further monitoring was deficient as utilization certificates were not submitted in time by the Kendras and even the pace of expenditure was not in consonance with the prescribed ceilings of Government of India.
- (v) Register of valuables (GAR 5) was not maintained.
- (vi) Physical verification of stores was not conducted in NYC Jalandhar(Punjab), NYC Ludhiana(Punjab) and NYC Chandigarh units of NYKS.

### 3. System of Physical verification of fixed assets:

- The physical verification of fixed assets relating to NYKS, Headquarter was conducted up to March 2016.
- Physical verification of stores was not conducted in NYC Jalandhar(Punjab), NYC Ludhiana(Punjab) and NYC Chandigarh units of NYKS.

### 4. System of Physical verification of inventory:

- The physical verification of inventory was conducted for the period 2015-16 but report is not furnished to audit.

### 5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

As per the annual accounts, no statutory dues over six months were outstanding as on 31.03.2016.
