## A summary report on 7th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme 2014-15

India is home to a large number of indigenous people, who are still untouched by the lifestyle of the modern world. Tribal people have their own culture, tradition, language and lifestyle and all these components play a key part in constructing the cultural heritage of India. The traditional and cultural distinction of each tribal community has made them distinguishable from each other and their cultural and traditional heritage add colour and variation to our culture as a whole and form a diverse Indian culture.

Indian tribal people reside in approximately fifteen percent of the country's area. They primarily live in various ecological and geo-climatic conditions ranging from plains, forests, hills and inaccessible areas that perhaps lie dotted in the panoramic Indian terrain. In India there are 104.2 million tribal people which constitute 8.6% of total population as per census 2011. India has the largest concentration of the tribal people anywhere in the world except perhaps in Africa (tribal.nic.in).

These tribal people also known as the Adivasis are the poorest in the country, Most of the tribal people are still dependent on hunting, agriculture and fishing for their livelihood. Due to lack of proper education, employment opportunities and proper mainstreaming facilities, many a times these tribal people, especially the youngsters get frustrated and deviated from the mainstream.

Therefore, in order to help the tribal youth to see the various parts of India, understand its diverse culture, economy, polity and social fabric and for wide exposure to scientific and technological advancement in the country and get benefit from it, to develop emotional linkages with their peer groups in other part of the country, to equip them with life skills and employability skills, to develop their personality and also to sensitize these tribal youth about their rich traditional and cultural heritage and enable them to preserve it for the future generation, the 7<sup>th</sup> Tribal Youth Exchange Programme was sanctioned by Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India to Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan.

The 7th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme has been organized at 10 venues across the country viz. Hyderabad, Bangalore, Delhi, Jaipur, Chandigarh, Chennai, Kolkata, Guwahati, Pune and Ahemdabad.

Objective of the 7th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme was

- To provide an opportunity to the tribal youth of 20 selected districts viz. Bastar, Bijapur, Dantewada, Kanker, Narayanpur, Sukma, Kondagaon, Chatra, Garhwa, Giridih, Gumla, Latehar, Palamu, Lohardaga, Simdega, W.Singhbhu, Khunti, Koraput, Malkangiri and Nuapada of 03 States viz. Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand and Odisha for understanding the technological and industrial advancement that have taken place in different state of the country with focus on various development activities, skill development educational & employment opportunities available there.
- To provide opportunities to the participants for interactions with local communities, Panchayati Raj Institutions, and the youths affiliated with the NYKS youth clubs so as to develop emotional and cultural ties with the youth placed in similar life situation in different parts of the Country,
- To develop personality of the tribal youth by enhancing their understanding of ten core life skills, identify their skill development oriented training needs and fulfillment of their legitimate career aspirations through employable skill scheme of government of India & State Government and provide them necessary guidance and career counseling.
- Exposure visit to places of Scientific and historical importance, Institute of National Importance, Successful Enterprises, Corporate Sectors, Educational Institutions.

## Programme

The programmes were organized at 10 venues viz Hyderabad, Bangalore, Delhi, Jaipur, Chandigarh, Chennai, Kolkata, Guwahati, Pune & Ahmadabad. The programme was graced by eminent personalities & VIPs.

CRPF took sessions on career Guidance and also motivated the youth to join CRPF and other Armed Forces to serve the nation. The interaction programme was followed by cultural programme where the artist from the states of Jharkhand, Odisha, and Chhatisgarh performed their traditional and folk dances.

The participants were given knowledge and information on RTI, Career Guidance, Tribal Welfare Schemes, Life Skills Education, Personality Development, Self Employment, National Integration and Awareness about HIV/AIDS. The Tribal Youth were also given Information about various schemes of Government for their economical, social and cultural development and to understand the unity in diversity of our country.

## Outcome of the 7<sup>th</sup> Tribal Youth Exchange Programme

- The 7<sup>th</sup> Tribal Youth Exchange Programme 2014-2015 was an inventive step as well as a well chalked out intervention programme for providing exposure to tribal youths of naxalite affected states to the lifestyle, social and cultural norms of visited places on the mainland viz. Delhi, Kolkata, Bengaluru, Chennai, Pune, Jaipur, Hyderabad, Ahmedabad, Guwahati and Chandigarh.
- The programmes helped in sensitizing the tribes about the rich and traditional cultural heritage of the tribal communities and enable them to preserve it for the future generation.
